

Mr. George Reeve began his career as an imaginative teacher ahead of his time. He maintained that role throughout his formal career as principal of St. John's from 1925—1952. At 82 years of age he died—still, in heart and mind, a young teacher, ahead of his time.



And you, I trust will not do less than those who went before you in your personal achievements and your contributions to the happiness and welfare of mankind.





#### Senior High President's Message



The most subtle and yet most effective ally of our educational system is . . . nostalgia.

Sooner or later most of us graduates will look back at our old alma mater, not in anger, but with a lump in our throat and a tear in our eye, "Those were the good old days." --

That old saying "Time heals all" is one of the greatest obstacles to any progress in our so-called "education" and our society.

How soon we forget how things were when we were young. Sentiment and complacency will replace hate and disgust for the institution we despised (or won't we remember?) and any hope for a system designed for individuals, not cattle, will be destroyed.

I can see it all now, say in twenty years -- sitting at home watching 3D color T.V., thumbing through this old yearbook with your kids. What will we be saying and thinking and remembering about "good old St. John's"? Will we think about the many times we were unjustly accused, tried, convicted, and sentenced by a teacher or principal (without even the judicial rights given to a confessed murderer) for some "horren-

dous crime" such as skipping a class or coming late? And will we remember the insane amount of homework assigned by SOME teachers as an act of faith in their God, the "System", often to satisfy the philosophy of "keep them busy, and they won't have time to get into trouble." And how about the piles we got sitting on the cold gym floor listening to the Billy Graham of St. John's, set the world straight from those "dirty hippies" ("I've been to Vancouver. I drove through there. I know all about those hippies putting razor blades in apples.") to "my son the leaf raker" ("when I told my son to rake the leaves, he thought I was crazy, but . . .") to the lack of leadership in our school ("I remember twenty years ago, we had real leaders, like Normie Hill. I taught him everything . . .").

Maybe we'll remember the hypocrisy displayed by principals who laid down their 10 commandments over the P.A. while "let's work together" and "Council should play an active part in decision making" came out of the other side of their mouths.

Maybe we'll remember the tin gods, the incompetents, and those teachers who have "taught" for so many years that they've forgotten what it is to learn. Do you remember such familiar greetings as "What are you doing in the halls?", "Where are you supposed to be?", "Where do you think you're going?", "Surprise test!", "You're not going anywhere.", "Let's see your homework!", "Where were you last period?", and "You're going to see the principal."

Remember the way we felt during those morning classes. We couldn't wait for that bell to go.

And maybe we'll recall the irrelevant courses, and the last minute cramming and brainwashing that they encouraged with the magic "test" or "exam", the sacred cows of education which determined nothing except your ability to memorize and regurgitate. All that counts is passing, not LEARNING.

All of these things just added up to one thing -- a hate for school; a hate for the whole paternalistic attitude towards students. We weren't people, we were STUDENTS.

But in twenty years will we forget all that? Will we brush away the complaints of our children with the old cliches; "What was good enough for me is good enough for you -- look, I survived, it couldn't be all that bad." And will we sit back and tsk tsk, "What's the younger generation coming to?"

If you don't think that your attitude can change so drastically, think for a minute of the Graduating Exercises on May 23. The speeches, filled with pride, passion, and a sense of real accomplishment, moved many a student. Three years of misery and suffering were dismissed as part of growing up. By the time the whole "ceremony" was over, the parents were thoroughly convinced that everything was okay. I'm sure that some of us felt pangs of regret at leaving our school. If all this could happen in one afternoon, how much more could we prostitute ourselves in twenty years.

Hypocrisy isn't confined to the older generation. It knows no age barrier. It's easy to vegetate that way if you ignore your conscience. I know of a young teacher who boasts of the classes he cut at University, yet proclaims that "no kid's going to skip my classes." Attitudes change when the system you once hated pays your salary.


While serving as school president, I met many hypocrites; old teachers, old principals, young teachers

and students. Every one of them admitted to being "just like me." A principal once confided to me the frustrations of his youth. "You know," he said, "I was once just like you. I had the same ideals, the same principles, you have. I wanted to change the school system, just like you do. But you have to compromise to live." Will you "sell out" just as he did? When you have the power to change the system, will you no longer have the will? Will you compromise away your ideals in the search for the path of least resistance? Will you catch the disease of social and financial ambition from our present society? Will you have the guts to be HUMAN?

I know already, many of us don't care any more about school. We're out; it's all behind us. But if we don't take the time to care our kids will have the same problems that we had. The generation gap will widen with the credibility gap between what we remember and what we say and what we do.

Sure there were some good times; the good teachers, the classes that came alive, the football games, the park. I know you'll have no trouble remembering these, but let's remember the bad as well as the good. If this message seems to be melodramatic and just a lot of bull, read it again in twenty years . . . and remember.







#### Senior High Council Report

The real obstacle to a democratic council in this school is attitudes. The students have the idea that council is powerless and that it is only a social organization meant to while away its time, arguing over bands and constitutions. They feel this way because Council, in fact, has no power. It is not a democratic body. How can a supposedly democratic council function in an autocratic school, run ultimately by the principals, who are about as representative of the 2400 students as a warden is to his inmates. Since we are supposedly not prisoners, we deserve better. That's where the principal's attitudes come in. For all intents and purposes, the students, they feel, have no right to make any decisions for themselves, since they are only students. After all, who has more experience, seniority, and thus wisdom. They have seen isolated examples of student irresponsibility: the potato chip sales of two years ago ("after all, if they can't handle potato chips, they can't handle freedom."). As if these instances have given them the divine right to proclaim for all time that students are, by definition, irresponsible.

It is easy to see the conflict that develops. Students feel they have the right to be treated as people and the Administration feels they are not capable of running their own affairs.

The whole problem is that the students are too apathetic to even realize that they have real power if they were only to use it. The power is acting together and working for a common goal. A strong council and strong student body that demands to be heard will be heard.

But who will listen to a few voices in the wilderness? They didn't listen this year. Those few voices were those of us who stuck our necks out and said what we felt about the things that mattered: Louise Roh, Lorna Guse, Teresa Slivinski, Joel Sarbit, Lenny Leven, Jim Marnoch, Joel Kettner, Brian Postl, and a few others.

Good luck, Stella and Joel, you'll need it.

#### The 1969

We have been imbued with a basic academic education. We have been shown the intricacies of our society through our literature. All that we essentially lack is experience. This is perhaps the only major fault in the school system. Now we are finished and we will be required to accumulate that experience quickly, to belong in the world. The transition from high school life may not be as comfortable as we might like it to be.

# Graduation Day





SUSAN MILLER - The quiet brains of 202. She takes pride in horrid, sickening, corny cowboy jokes. The rest of us are still trying to figure her out.






#### Week



## Ray Bursten Memorial Trophy



Both Glen and Bill participated on the Varsity Soccer team and guided the team to many victories. Glen and Bill both played guards




## Freshman Boys' Basketball







## Varsity Boys' Basketball
