Student Council

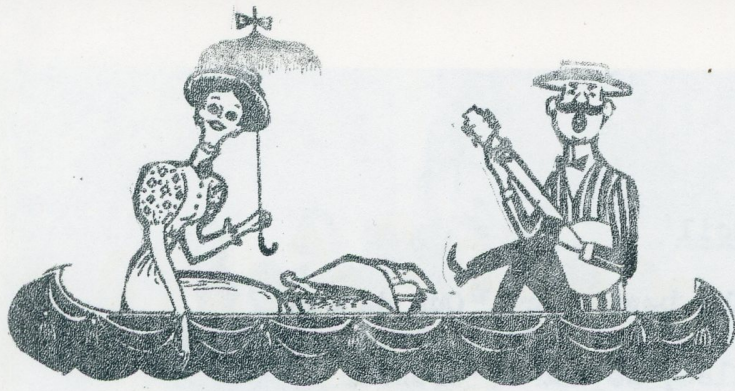
