








DEDICATION



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The term "Graduate" as applied to the high school student of today is really a misnomer. The word "graduate" seems to imply a sense of completeness - even of finality. Your studies during the past three years will have convinced you that you are completing a transition to a field of larger horizons and greater opportunity.

During your high school years, you have received but fleeting glimpses of the sum total of knowledge - but sufficient we hope to stimulate you to continue your quest for knowledge. We hope, too, that in your associations with your teachers and fellow students at St. John's, you may have absorbed something more than mere knowledge. We earnestly hope that we have awakened in each of you a sense of responsibility. Personnel people pay a very special attention to our youth who showed evidence in his school years of willingness to shoulder responsibility - a post on the school council, or the school paper, in the direction of sports or music, or in the organization of class or school activities. For we are

social beings and our happiness - our very existence depends upon our relations with other human beings. Identification of one's self with established duties and rights is part of the process by which a person attains social personality.

Self discipline is not a form of self punishment, nor does it mean that we act according to our likes and dislikes, but according to principles of right and wrong.

If, during your stay at St. John's, you have acquired a genuine desire for knowledge, sharpened your ability to think, learned something of self discipline, and displayed a willingness to accept responsibility, then you have provided yourself with a bench mark from which to measure your future pro-

people, formed new friendships and associations, renewed old ones, and through these interpersonal relationships we have gained a little more insight into that complex realm of human relations.

In the course of our attendance at St. John's we have also learned of the high principles and ideals of our forefathers. This may have disconcerted us, troubled us, or even outraged us; but above all, it taught us, and as a lesson in life it was therefore as useful and meaningful as anything we had learned from our texts. There could be detected a gradually awakening awareness of the external forces that were moulding us and our youthful ideas as we matured.

But then I've rambled on long enough. Moreover, I am quite convinced that individually you will just as well, if not better appreciate what is contained between these covers without anything it is in my capacity to say at this time. Nevertheless, I would like to add one final remark.




JUNIOR HIGH PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

John Ruskin once said of education: "It is a painful, continual, and difficult work to be done by kindness, by watching, by warning, by precept and by praise, but above all, by example."

You, our parents and teachers have taken upon yourselves this enormous task, you have employed the tools of kindness, watching, warning, precept and praise and you have set fine examples for us to follow. We, of the graduating classes salute you and extend to you our gratitude as we stand before you, the fruits of your endeavours, hoping that you are proud.

At this time, we pause from our classes to look back fondly into our past and to gaze into our future. Our years at St. John's have climaxed our journey to this day and have given us three great gifts whose value can never be measured and which will remain with us for as long as we live.

Now, equipped with knowledge to guide us, pleasant memories to fill our years with joyful recollection, and friends to spur us onward, we go into the world to continue the work that you, our predecessors, have started.

We go into a world where we must be vitally concerned with happenings not only at home, but on every continent and island throughout the world. No longer can we sit back and let someone else take on the responsibilities and duties of the citizens of the world. Never before has youth been faced with such a challenge. Today we are faced with the constant threat of nuclear destruction; we are faced with the problem of eliminating discrimination and its pathetic results; we are faced with the responsibility of feeding countless thousands of starving people, people who are dying at the rate of twelve per minute. It is our duty, yours and mine to correct these situations and to solve these problems. Now, more than ever before, the future of the world depends upon us, the youth of the world.

Our strength lies in our education. We have been given the foundations of knowledge by you, our parents, and teachers and we can now set forth to improve our lives and the world in which we live. With this great weapon in our hands we can face the challenge boldly, mocking at fear and overcoming all obstacles to fulfill our dreams and prove ourselves worthy of your faith in us and your endeavors on our behalf. And, with the benefits of our learning, perhaps we can be the kind of people that this prayer asks for:

"God send us men with hearts ablaze,

All truth to love, all wrong to hate.

These are the patriots nations need,

These are the bulwarks of our state."







The dance had been a success and so had the years spent at St. John's High.











In the following game the Tigers were snowed under by a strong Kelvin team. Following that the


GOLDSTEIN TROPHY

The famed series between our Tigers and the Daniel MacIntyre Maroons threatened to end up like a broken record for the umteenth time with


