

## To the graduates . . .


"How dull it is to pause — to make an end To rust unburnished, not to shine in use!"



## VALEDICTORY

Professor Hopper, Mr. Ridd, Honored Guests, Teachers, Fellow Graduates:

This audience is gathered under the patronage of an institution of long and distinguished history, and I gratefully acknowledge the kindness by which I am permitted to appear upon your program.

My mind is filled with memories of things which have transpired while in or under the influence of St. John's

High School.

Some are good and some are bad, Some are funny and some are sad.

We entered as timid and unsure freshmen and quickly became less timid, but it is difficult to say whether we have ever become less unsure. It is not possible to say that we, as high school graduates, have the equipment necessary for our life ahead; in fact, we have the barest of bare beginnings. This does not necessarily apply only to students who intend to complete a more formal education, but likewise to those who intend to start working after graduation.

What have we learned in high school? What has our high school contributed to us, and what have we contributed to our high school?

Through social outlets in our school, which we would have otherwise been denied, we have had the opportunity to associate with others of our own age, and learned some of the give and take so necessary in every aspect of life. In athletics we have experienced teamwork; we have learned to submerge our own individuality for the cause of the team and the goal at hand. Our school life has provided for us entertainment and relaxation as well as much of the necessary education and preparation for future life. In all these respects we gratefully acknowledge the determination and understanding mustered by our teachers in overcoming almost unsurmountable obstacles in attempting to instruct the likes of us! Without doubt, high school is the hub around which the sphere of our lives has been centred.



But our school has done, or should have done, much more than this. We recall that we have had the privilege of practicing self-government in clubs and in matters pertaining to the functioning of the school. We hope that this privilege will help us to accept and retain our position as citizens of our nation.

Democracy, the dream of our forefathers, is a reality of today, yet challenged by forces which threaten to engulf the entire world in the

darkness of slavery. Here, we are, or hope to be, prepared to recognize and meet this challenge and to take our place as citizens of a democratic nation. But the forces which threaten our freedom are not entirely from without. We have within ourselves the seeds of our decay, our selfishness, our pride, our prejudices, our lack of consideration, our dishonesty—whenever our thoughts and actions diverge from the professed ideals of our so called Christian, Democratic nation. We easily see these faults in other nations, and other people, but seldom recognize the cancer within ourselves.

It is only as we do recognize them, and fight to rid ourselves and our nation of these things, that we can grow together to a new world everyone longs for and dreams about. And it is there that we, as students contribute most to our high school, to our city, and to our nation, by working hard, by aiming high, with free hearts, clean hands, and pure motives.

And, although we may not have learned all we need to know to get along in the world, if we have learned nothing but HOW to learn, then we have learned a lot—and that can help carry us through anything that may be ahead

In closing I felt that the words of the Right Honourable Arthur Meighen would be appropriate:

"The footsteps of time move fast, and how short the term of life — very brief it is to those who are eager to toil and achieve."


We are quite certain that we have chosen in Beatrice the outstanding student of the year, whom we shall always be proud to number among our graduates.



The students may justly be proud of this concert, for it truly showed what we are capable of.










CHEERLEADING

The cheerleaders extend their thanks to Miss Ritchie who supervised them.




















### CURLING














### OUTSTANDING ART STUDENTS














## SENIOR BOYS MAKE SEMIS





The Juvenile squad, having no veterans to bolster their ranks, gave their best in every encounter and carried St. John's colors high throughout the season.





### Volleyball



The coaching was capably handled by Lovie Popowich.



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
