

Dedicated To The Memory Of George Joseph Reeve



"Men may come and men may go, but the memory of George Joseph Reeve will go on as long as St. John's High School stands."

Mr. Reeve was born in 1886, in England, where he graduated from Oxford University. He came to Winnipeg in 1913, and gained much of his teaching experience at St. John's High. He went on to become a principal of our school in 1925 and remained until his retirement in 1952.

Mr. Reeve initiated student self-government, for he felt that this would help students to develop their sense of responsibility. This was one of the first student councils in Canada. Under G. J. Reeve's leadership, the school also undertook the organization of a school library.

Because of his great perception and foresight into the problems of the student, G. J. Reeve will long be remembered for his contributions to the progress of our school system.



Editorial

This year at St. John's was not uneventful, but it was not what can be called a particularly exciting one, either. Under a sterile student council, devoid of new imaginative ideas for student government and activities, an already apathetic student body did little to shake off the general boredom and stagnation that set in.

There were exceptions to this general mood of "nothing" that cast a real ray of light on an otherwise bleak outlook. Although council was an unproductive *token* of student involvement, there were a few individuals who felt the need and did their best to make a meaningful contribution to school spirit, and though a minority, they raised the calibre of council by the very fact that they were there.

Although the Junior Red Cross was a dismal failure, I know that there were one or two individuals who did care, but became submerged in the majority.

Although the Flare itself was nearly killed by student non-involvement, I know that it was a supreme effort by a small number of individuals, out of a student body of 700, that pulled the book to its feet. I have nothing but the highest praise for my very close associates Richard Yaffe, Susan Israel, and Donna Kormilo, who helped accomplish an amazing task — putting out a yearbook; in fact, establishing a yearbook.

I find it interesting to note that in the only activity not plagued by apathy, St. John's was superlative. I am referring, of course, to our track teams, which brought to this school two city championships and one provincial championship. An amazing number of students either participated or made vocal their support, and look at the results. We have every right to be proud of them, and I hope that in future years we will be proud of them — proud enough to support, participate, and keep them at the top.

And the top is where all our teams should be. We have the talent but won't show the interest. If our school keeps on this way, we have nothing to be proud of. We can only expect to go down, not up, and there is only one way to get to the top, and stay at the top — GIVE A DAMN!

In summing up, I shall include the classical "capsulized valedictory" material which is standard for most yearbook editorials, and which I have omitted up to now. I would like to thank staff advisors Miss Teplitsky, Mrs. Israels, and Mr. Swandell, along with Mr. Isaak, who helped a great deal, and a few others who kept us company, and went to the stores for us. I would also like to extend my best wishes to all of you taking the time out to glance over this short collection of my beefs, opinions, and impressions, of this year at St. John's.
