Be optimistic, set goals for yourself, and learn to adapt intelligently to the conditions which confront you and turn them to your advantage. Have an honest purpose in life, a just estimate of yourself and others, and obey rules which you know to be right. Do not become disheartened by those who moan about the lack of opportunity. There will always be room for those who have prepared themselves through education and who have an open mind and a willing hand.

Our sincere best wishes are extended to all of you. May you experience success and happiness in your various fields of endeavour.

To the graduates of 1963, au revoir and good luck! You have completed an important part of your life, and have something to be proud of. I only wish I had come to know more of you better.

To the rest of you, for whom graduation lies in the future and who will be back at St. John's next year, here are a few observations from a relative new-comer.

I have seen you put your hearts into your performance on playing court, track, gridiron and musical stage, and I have heard you cheer your players with wild enthusiasm. You have spirit! I have seen you swirl and sway and twist at your social affairs. You have grace and poise, and stamina. I have seen your examination mark-sheets. They have measles.



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



### Valedictory

Mr. Macfarlane, Mr. Guest, Members of the staff, Honored Guests, Fellow Graduates:

A long time ago an author wrote: "As a youth it was given me the proud task of delivering the high school valedictory address. This I did, with trembling voice and quaking knees. Oh, what soul-stirring oratory I imagined poured from my lips! In my callow ignorance I distilled a lifetime of advice into a few historic moments. How presumptuous it all seems in retrospect — yet how important it was to me then; and how important I must admit, it still seems to me now."

The above recollection was written thirty years after the author graduated. But note well, the vivid remembrance; the warm nostalgia for happier days past.

Surely this is the way we shall all remember this day — the day of our graduation.

Today is a day recalling cherished memories, memories of interesting, searching years: memories of friends who have moulded and enriched our lives It is a symbol of priceless treasures, to be guarded jealously; a day which will ever remind us of those unseen realities which are veritably St. John's High School: Pride. Scholarship, Honor, Good fellowship; the undying spirit of the thousands of St. John's men and women who have gone forth to lives "noble and strong", and who summon us to follow.

As graduates of a great high school we have enjoyed, in generous measure the opportunity to acquire a broad educational background; a breadth of vision, an appreciation of relative values and an increased ability for self-expression—all of which are invaluable assets both to an individual and to society.

Have we taken advantage of these opportunities? The value of the two or three years spent at our school depends entirely upon the use we make of our knowledge for the betterment of ourselves, our families and the larger communities of which we may be a part.

The world today demands special service of all persons who have had special advantages, and among the most valuable advantages anyone can have is that of a carefully planned education, because education opens the treasure house of the world's knowledge in every field of human thought. We are, in a very true sense, the heirs of the ages, and our education willingly provided by a society which values education, means for us the possession of our inheritance.

Many years ago a famed and beloved teacher was asked: "What is your greatest single joy on earth?" And this was his reply: "A little girl, lost, with tears in her eyes, asked me the way. I showed her . . . and she went off singing, her song echoing in my ears."

Is this not the philosophy of our teachers at St. John's High School? Fortunate indeed is the person, who at sometime in his life, gains the treasured association of an inspired teacher. We have been favoured, for we have many such teachers at our school Teachers whose greatest joy is to put us on the right path . . . even if they would rather do so without our singing echoing in their ears, especially during class.

Gratefully and earnestly, we, the graduating class of 1963, offer thanks to the teaching staff for their unselfish efforts on our behalf. Thank you — we shall never forget you.

What lies ahead? A doubtful and suspicious world awaits the enthusiasm and inspiration of youth. Will we stand idly by satisfied with recollections of past achievements or paralyzed by past failures?

Will we offer merely a temporary solution to the awesome immediate problems; or will we use the courage and knowledge that we possess and triumphantly bring to pass high hopes and high ideals for the future?

The past few years have been marked by tremendous important political, social, and economic changes which have affected virtually every part of the world.

Even here at St. John's, in our safe secure little world we see startling changes. We are all aware that this is the last Grade 11 class that will ever graduate from St. John's. Massive additions are being made to our school. Soon the old section

will be demolished; hallowed halls will be destroyed; creaking wooden floors ingrained with half a century of memories, will give way to antiseptic noise-proof tiles.

There are some things however, which will always remain unchanged and constant. The fundamental truths inculcated in us at St John's will not be destroyed. St. John's High School may assume an entirely new exterior within the next decade, but we may give thanks that there is safe anchorage in the inner realm. of spirit.

The teaching staff will always dedicate itself to instilling in future St. John's students the same admirable qualities which have been characteristic of all graduates since 1911 — honor, honesty, courage, courtesy, good humour which is goodness and wisdom combined, and brotherhood.

Truly the most enlightening experience we have enjoyed at St. John's has been seeing people of all religions, nationalities and backgrounds striving in harmony for the common good—the good of our school.

It was Edwin Markham who said:

"The crest and crowning of all good, Life's final star, is Brotherhood!"

So long have St. John's students worked together in class-rooms, in clubs, on the track and field and elsewhere that many of us have failed to see the beauty of our relationship at this school.

We need only read the newspapers to see that such concord does not exist at all institutions of learning. When we have graduated from our High School and the pessimists cry that there is no chance of the nations of the earth working together let us remember St. John's where the Torch of Tolerance shone so brightly.

Indeed change has been the keynote of the age during which the members of the graduating class have lived. A political and social cataclysm has resulted in a world torn in half by warring ideologies.

Age old social institutions and religious beliefs are now being forced to prove their right to endure. Human survival rests under swords hung by only weak and slender threads. Such is the atmosphere into which we are about to be ejected.

No assurance can be ours that the future will offer the guarding and guiding hands of our younger days. Some say the outlook for us is far from desirable, but what a challenge the world gives those who will but a little later assume its charge.

Now, as never before is this opportunity for courage, determination, thought and action. Now is the time for youth to use its training to the best advantage. Youth trained to solve the problems of life, to bear life's disappointments and to enjoy its pleasures should not fail!

But, in accepting this challenge youth must not forget that courage and daring will not always take the place of experience, and that determination and action must be tempered by calm deliberation.

In addition, youth must not conceive that the only important deeds are those which are founded on material things. This old world has had enough materialism which has been weighed and found wanting.

The idealistic, the ethical, and spiritual efforts of youth are just as likely to clear away fear and suspicion as are the more tangible efforts. The hope of the day is for young men and women of fundamental knowledge sustained by a clear vision of the problems of the world in which they live.

In the words of Alfred Noyes:



JOAN CHAPYK — One of the quieter females in the room, but she has a sparkling personality that should take her far. This kid is bound to be tops in whatever she attempts.
















BARRY SMITH — "Smitty" is the strong silent type the girls are wild about, but Barry places work before play or is it the other way around? Hey, Barry!

ALLAN HILL — Allan is a quieter member of the class — he's always asleep! Allan is a member of the wild after hours math class.







MAXINE SUCHAROV — Maxine is always calm, cool and collected—never a hair out of place, Incidentally, she's very interested in Edwardian history.



## COUNCIL REPORT

Thanks to the interest of certain students, a Pep Club was formed this year by Miss Knapp and her girls. The club sponsored a Spirit Day which proved to be a great success.






















# TRIAL BY
