And you, I trust will not do less than those who went before you in your personal achievements and your contributions to the happiness and welfare of mankind.



I would now like to end this editorial with the Torch motto, "If you think the Torch is bad, look at the Torch Room!"











#### Junior High President's Message

In November, it was decided that the Junior High will try having their own yearbook next year on one year trial basis.





The main accomplishment of Council this year must be regarded as the allocation of \$435 to purchase and install an electric scoreclock in the gym next fall.


Charity Week raised some \$800 which was divided among the Canadian Cancer Society, the Heart Fund, Oxfam and our foster child--Wong Yolk Sui.


The structure of Council was revised; a poll on the issue of a smoking room was circulated among the parents; unfortunately the initiator did not finish the poll or collect any valid results.

However, neither this nor any other year can be regarded as a successful year for Council. The job that Student Government at St. John's is doing is an unimportant and insignificant one. This will continue to remain so as long as two factors, each of which contribute to the other, continue to exist. These are rampant student apathy and massive office control of student affairs and mistrust of students.

The apathy is caused in part, if not totally, by the "public school mentality". After ten to twelve years of strict discipline, senseless rules and regulations, and a prevailing atmosphere which treated kids as somewhat less that equal human beings, most students have given in to the system. They no longer have any desire to oppose heavy-handed authority.

The system has done its job. It has crushed the creative initiative of another generation.





St. John's Tigers roared all the way this year with an exceptional performance during the season; but were unfortunately disqualified due to the ineligibility of two grade 9 students on the team.


