



VICE-PRINCIPALS' MESSAGES







Up until that time we will have been led always by sure hands, patted on the shoulder for our good deeds, softly rebuked for our mistakes and always have had someone to advise us in time of trouble. We have been idealists looking forward to a glowing future, a world that is willing and waiting to accept us. This has been our life up until now—our life in school.

We will enter the world as glowing idealists, but unfortunately it will not be as we have long dreamed. There will be no one to take special interest in us, no one to advise, so that one mistake may mean oblivion. With the nations of the world becoming increasingly hostile to one another, it is as if the sword of Damocles were hanging over the head of each and everyone of us. If this can happen, a lasting peace—a peace free from frost will not seem so far beyond our reach and the tensions brought on by the load each person is living in such an age must bear can be relieved.

We at St. John's have achieved this feeling to a very great extent for there are people of varied religions, creeds and colors in our area, all of whom have learned to live, associate and be friendly with one another. If we can apply to real life what we have learned at St. John's and if others can do the same then we will have made a start, a foundation on which we can begin to build a lasting peace. If our situation here at St. John's can be projected on the grandest scale, then the peoples of the earth will have come a long way in solving their problems.

The fundamental desire of people everywhere is to live in peace—to live without the fear of awakening to nothing. When we realize this and when we suddenly understand that we are all striving for the same thing, then and only then will we have approached Utopia. Until that time we will remain in insignificant little battles destroying our common ambition.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The St. John's student council of 1963-64 had a successful year, introducing a few new ideas which council hopes will be followed in the years to come. Perhaps the most timely was the creation of a new post on council, assistant secretary. Rachelle Butler was the first to serve in this capacity.

The other officers of the student council were: president, Jim Postl; vice-president, Ted Plantinga; and secretary, Gertie Dubnicoff. The committee chairman and chairwomen were: Dennis Pelisek, who handled finances, Sandra Rosolowich, of the Social Committee, Betty Shinkarik, who was in charge of publicity, Eileen White, Rings, and Pins, Brian Burdy of the J's and Awards Committee, and Rosemarie Mohr, who chaired the Constitution Revision Committee. Miss Hodgson, served as staff adviser and expert on procedure.

Our radio station, SJON, was revived this year under a new format. Instead of using the P.A. system, as has been done in years past, our disc jockeys, Len Rosolowich and Eugene Gubernachuk, chose to broadcast from the lunchroom.

Council celebrated Hallowe'en in a unique way this year. A special committee under the chairmanship of Dave Bilinkoff was set up to entertain the children in Shriner's Hospital. Food and decorations were contributed by local businesses. On the afternoon of Hallowe'en the party was held with several students from St. John's performing. The affair proved to be a blessing, both to the children and to the students who participated. It is hoped that this practice will be continued in future years.

It was decided to hold our graduation dance outside the school this year in an effort to improve attendance by providing an atmosphere more exciting than that of the school gymnasium. This was the first year that the grade XI's, with the exception of the two commercial classes were not allowed to attend graduation because they can no longer enter university from grade XI.

The student council voted to continue supporting our foster child, Wong Yolk Sui. A special committee was appointed to write to him on behalf of the student body. The student council sponsored study hall again this year with the council members supervising. The council also sponsored a successful charity week. The student exchange program, instigated by last year's council, was continued.

Although the council was very active this year, its record is by no means perfect. However, in everything it did, the student council kept the individual student in mind and did its best.

The East yesterday, — mysterious, oriental; today, — a thermal nuclear power. The West yesterday, — cowboys, Indians; today, — Cape Kennedy rockets. A simple word association test and we find how modern rivalries have influenced our minds. Rivalries in which education can be the only victor. Rivalries which have no part for the uneducated man, but which nevertheless engulf him with all their complexities. Overpowered by these complexities, the illiterate has little hope for success in today's modern world. Although the key to success has been offered to many, it has been rejected by those dropping out of high school.

During our adolescent years, we are subjected to extensive advertising campaigns usually through the media of television and the press showing us what becomes of people who do not have an acceptable educational background. These people are usually pictured as unshaven, poorly dressed, down-trodden workers standing outside the unemployment office. This is not the complete picture however. Uneducated people with ability have been known to get ahead also. But with the present emphasis being put on education, chances of success on mere ability are substantially reduced.

No matter what field a youth enters he must use his brain. The scientific and economic truths of yesterday on which we would have staked our lives do not hold true today. This is why we must endeavor to exhaust every opportunity of gaining basic knowledge at school. It may appear to be a bright idea to leave school early and join the

wage-earning force in this prosperous society, but it is an idea that requires a second look.

The immediate wage may meet all your needs, as a single person, but, unless you have gained the benefits of an education for understanding increasingly complex problems and new situations, your first wage may be somewhere near the top of your earning capacity. Taking a long range view, would it not be better to carry on your schooling, brushing aside the temptation to own a car, have a free dollar and enjoy high life at once, in favor of what is best for you in the long run?

Do not make a wrong choice. You may for a time be content with a steady job, a car you can rent, and membership in a golf club. Such a life can be smugly lived for a time. Yet for the man with any ability how empty will such days appear when later years suddenly close the door to alternatives. Then it becomes clear that the better part of life has been spent and your backward look shows only a trivial round of routine affairs.

What chance is there for the drop-out to attain a place of significance in our country? A drop-out will harm not only himself but will stagnate in society. It is he who contributes to the unemployment problem. Yes, to you prospective drop-outs, don't rot in the residue of limited knowledge or cringe in the black depths of ignorance, but continue your education and light a pathway to success.


GRADUATION


BALLROOM DANCING





Freshie Day was climaxed by the Freshie Dance, an appropriate ending to a successful week.













THE ART OF CONJURING

What is this art which mystifies as it entertains; which baffles as it bewitches? Is it a creation of the devil? The art of conjuring has enchanted audiences for thousands of years. It has survived the ravages of time and progressed so rapidly, that it is now considered to be one of the best forms of entertainment. Harry Kellar, a famous American illusionist, once said: "Magic, like every art, must keep pace in progress with the advance of human intelligence". To fully understand this statement one must be familiar with the colorful story behind the art of conjuring.


The history of legerdemain falls into three main periods, each period overlapping another in respect to both performers and tricks. The first period began in a small way before recorded history, and tapered off into the succeeding period during the eighteenth century. Prestidigitaters were suspected of dealing in witchcraft and trading with the devil. For this reason they were compelled to perform outdoors at fairs alongside jugglers, contortionists, and storytellers. On special occasions command performances were given by magicians in the great halls of nobility. Their tricks were very small and consisted of simple apparatus such as balls, cups, and ropes.

The middle of the eighteenth century marked the beginning of the second great period in the history of conjuring. Magic became allied to mechanics. The magician wore flowing robes; his platform was covered with heavy, bulky apparatus, much of it worked by hidden manpower or ingenious mechanical devices. Prestidigitaters became more artistic and began to hire theatres for full evening performances. Their art flourished and finally seemed to be firmly established as a form of entertainment. However, this mechanized form of legerdemain was not to last for a long time.


Robert-Houdin, a French magician living in the ninteenth century, improved the art of conjuring by doing away with the clumsy mechanical contraptions of his immediate predecessors and by working on a clear stage. He performed seemingly impossible feats and invented many new effects. It was his efforts which brought about the transition of conjuring from the second period to the third, or modern period.

In this modern period, magic has become more than just an art. It employs all known sciences and is fundamentally a branch of practical psychology. Its complex nature has made it an art which requires many years of study. Ottokar Fischer, a great German magician, once stated that if a person was to truly appreciate the art in the art of magic, he would have to understand the wonderful co-operation between all of the factors, physical, psychical, and technical which together, make up the essence of magic.

The art of conjuring will never die. It will continue to baffle and amaze its audiences, because it is the art of arts, forever changing, forever improving.


TIGERS WIN . .




The Freshman team played W.K.C.I., River East Collegiate, Glenlawn, and Garden City Collegiate in exhibition games but lost each.




Since Grade XII has become compulsory for graduation from high school a change has been made in choosing the award. The winner must be a graduating student with a good average.

Those graceful animals Galloping away Those beautiful horses Rambling all day.

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
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


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
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
