






### Principal's Message


To the Graduates:

"Look backward with gratitude, look upward with confidence, and look forward with hope."









Burning in the hand he holds in his; And his Horizon,





## A ROLLING STONE GATHERS NO MOSS

This is an example of Aristotelian—science, coming to a conclusion by logic without a controlled experiment. This method was discarded after the time of Galileo Galilei, who wanted to be a priest and whose father wanted him to be a lawyer, and who therefore became a doctor. By watching the chandeliers in the Cathedral of Pisa, dropping balls from the Leaning Tower in the same place, and finally getting kicked out from Pisa University, he established the modern scientific method. Science has never been the same since.

But getting back to our subject, the suitability of a fragment of naturally—occurring, relatively hard mineral material in rotary motion about a horizontal axis for the growth of Bryophyta of the order Bryales, the true mosses, whose normal habitat is large fragments of mineral material. The habitat, or, as it is commonly called, the "stone" must be kept in motion for a long enough period of time for the growth of the Bryales, and suitable conditions of moisture and temperature must be maintained.

Preliminary indications are that this type of mineral material does not "gather" Bryophyta, in the active sense, because of the absence of moveable appendages and of any form of life in the mineral material. Also, the mineral material must not have an excessive mass, or it will crush the Bryophyta. However, there remains much work to be done, In the future a more formal paper may be published giving the complete effects or rotary motion on the suitability of rock fragments as habitats for Bryophyta.

#### MY IDEA OF A HERO

In my estimation, a "hero" is one who expresses his opinions despite public opposition and lack of approval. Such are Communists, civil-rights workers and exposers of malfeasance and corruption. Although we cannot all be of one mind with many of these individuals, we must admire them for their straightforwardness and intrepidity. I have chosen three men who illustrate these traits.

Fifth-century Athens was a most worldly city. For approximately fifty years it baked in the warm sun of opulence. However, there was at the same time a philosophical ferment throughout the Grecian world to counterbalance this trend of affluence and greed. Chief among the "sophists" or wandering teachers of philosophy was Socrates. Little is known about this man except that he was a potter by trade. Socrates wandered through the streets of Athens exposing the sham of Athenian life. He taught that knowledge is the gateway to virtue, which in turn opens the doors to happiness. However, he felt that absolute knowledge is unattainable. Socrates was accused of having "corrupted the youth of Athens" and was called to account by the elders of Athens. After defending himself admirably, he was executed by being forced to drink hemlock.

Jesus of Nazareth was a humble rabbi who supported himself by working as a carpenter. Purported to have been the "Son of God" and the "Messiah", Jesus was in reality a moralist who conscientiously objected to the religion of the patriarchs. He deplored the fact that his countrymen were shackled by the "letter of the law" rather than emancipated by its spirit. He preached a doctrine of loving-kindness, humility and justice and felt that this essence of Judaism be a universal religion. The "priests and Pharisees", however, felt that this upstart was undermining their authority. Of course we all know the outcome of this mistrust of the elders of Israel.

The sixteenth century was an age in which the fervor of Reformation dwelt within the bones of many who desired change. Such men as Calvin, Luther, Huss and Zwingli voiced their controversial views. Perhaps the man whose opinions were most revolutionary was Michael Servetus, a Spaniard by birth. He renounced the traditional Christian concept of the trinity and wrote numerous books and pamphlets to disseminate his Christian philosophy. Once he held a colloquy with John Calvin. Apparently Calvin was greatly frustrated after this encounter for, when Servetus happened to sojourn in Geneva, he was apprehended by Calvin's agents. 




score was 14-1.



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





### **CURLING CLUB**




Our musically inclined students have surely found this a profitable and enjoyable year.




Students make music together at an early morn-ing practice.

# Techonian

The tremendous success of last year's Techonian made it very difficult for this year's staff to live up to the high standards set by their previous year's assortment of columnists, reporters, assistants, and business personnel. However, through undying efforts of the advisers, editors, assistants, department heads, and other contributors, and the essential support of the students, the Techonian Staff was able to publish, conservatively speaking, a most successful series of issues.

1964-65 was not a year without changes as far as the Techonian was concerned. In order to promote greater support from the Junior High Section of the school, and to produce a more coherent paper, a coalition was proposed, uniting both Junior and Senior High Sections of the paper. The staff itself also encountered several changes. A number of Department Heads were enlisted to be in charge of allotted sections of the paper, and to ensure a closer relationship with the Junior High Staff. This also solved the problem of a separate Junior High editor. The Techonian successfully carried on the tradition of former Techonian Dances to such an extent that some five hundred students enjoyed one of the most fun-filled evenings of their lives, listening to the sounds of the "Kurtis Kombo" and witnessing a thrilling chariot race. It was the tremendous success of this dance which assured the financial success of the paper for the second year in a row.

Finally, the Techonian wishes to extend its sincere appreciation to Mr. Goodman and Miss Grosser, the staff advisers, for their untiring efforts in guiding and assisting the staff in their various problems and propositions, and to Mr. Willows for his patience in helping to settle the financial matters of the paper. The staff also wishes to thank last year's editors, Mark Posner, and Barry Garfinkel, without whose help, encouragement, and constructive criticisms the existence of the Techonian would have been inconceivable. However, the greatest credit must fall upon the readers; the students and teachers whose support in purchases and contributions essentially made the paper possible.
