







Editorial

At the end of this school year a great era for St. John's will come to an end. Come next September the students will find many changes in our school, but the most important change will be the absence of Mr. Ridd. It is to our principal and friend that we dedicate our editorial.

Born the son of a Methodist minister at Killarney, Manitoba, Mr. Ridd received his early schooling at schools in Morris, Man., Birtle, Miami and Franklin, Manitoba. He obtained his B.A. at United College (History & English), and went on to receive his Master of Arts (History), and Bachelor of Education degrees at the University of Manitoba. Mr. Ridd also took one term in the Faculty of Education at the University of Chicago.

Mr. Ridd began his long teaching career by teaching summer school at Hilbre, Manitoba. From Hilbre he went to Festubert, Saskatchewan on the Montana border, fifty miles south of the railway at Kincaid where he taught seven months of school. He was then appointed principal of the four room Consolidated School at Arden, Manitoba, and later became the principal of the eight room school at The Pas. Upon entering the Winnipeg School System Mr. Ridd taught history at St. John's Tech. After a brief period of time Mr. Ridd was appointed principal of Riverview Elementary School. From Riverview he went on to become the principal of Machray Junior High School. Leaving Machray, Mr. Ridd went to the Technical-Vocational High School where he was Associate Principal. In 1952 Mr. Ridd was appointed Principal of St. John's High School. Mr. Ridd also taught for one year in Disabled Soldiers Civil Re-establishment School in Winnipeg following three years in the Canadian Expeditionary Force with the Winnipeg Rifles overseas.

Mr. Ridd's past and present activities are numerous. He is the Past Master of the PRINCE RUPERT'S LODGE, A.F. & A.M., and is also the past President of the Manitoba Teachers' Society. Mr. Ridd represented the Alumni of the University of Manitoba on the Board of Governors for a term of three years. At present he is a Director of the Family Bureau, a member of the Senate of United College, and is a member of Session of Westminster United Church.

Once he retires Mr. Ridd hopes to continue his hobbies, golf in the summer, curling in the winter, and reading.

St. John's will miss Mr. Ridd, with his warm smile and friendly manner. May God grant him longevity and continued happiness.

Principal's Message

During the many years I have worked in the St. John's community I have come to know not only thousands of students but also their parents, and it is only right that now I should express my gratitude to them also. In every way they have tried to understand and appreciate what the school has been endeavoring to do and have supported it to the best of their abilities. We could always count on their attendance at concerts or operettas, at displays and teas, and at Parents' Night at the school. For the encouragement produced by this interest on the part of the parents and community I am deeply grateful.

Yuri Gagarin's successful flight into outer space on April 10th marks the end of an era in human history. It would seem that, in a very much more limited way, my retirement as Principal will mark the end of an era in the history of St. John's High School. The old school of nostalgic memory has been replaced by a bigger building, an increased staff and greatly enlarged student body — an integration of grades Seven to Twelve. With these changed conditions and in these changing years my fervent hope and fond expectation is that the standards and traditions of the past may be maintained and raised—that the torch may be held aloft "usque ad astra".

Mr. Harold Tayrup




In September of this school year Mr. Harold Laycup, a member of the St. John's staff for eighteen years, passed away. The Torch staff would like to dedicate this page to his memory and to his family.

Mr. Laycup was born in 1905 in Foxwarren, Manitoba. He received his early education in Foxwarren and continued with his studies at the University of Manitoba. He graduated from the university with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture, and also a Bachelor of Education degree.

Mr. Laycup began his teaching career in Plumas and Deloraine. In Killarney he served as a principal. In 1941, he joined the Norwood Collegiate Staff and from 1942 until 1960 he was a member of the teaching staff of St. John's High School. At St. John's Mr. Laycup was head of our Science Department, and taught chemistry, biology, and general science.

Mr. Laycup was a member of the School Master's Association besides taking an active interest in bowling, curling, and professional affairs.

Mr. Laycup was admired and loved by both teachers and students alike. A great man who will be missed by all, this page is dedicated to his memory and to his family.

It is the year that marks the 50th anniversary of St. John's. In the fall of 1960, Mr. Ridd was proud to read a letter we had received from the American Department of Technology. This department had taken a survey in order that they might improve the standard of education in American schools. They had learned, during their studies, that St. John's was the most productive school in North America. Through St. John's portals have passed more doctors, lawyers, teachers, scientists, and men and women of other professions than from any other secondary school on this continent. Air Marshall Roy Slemmon, Deputy Commander of NORAD, Harry Grant, Former Director of UNESCO, Max Freedman, Washington Correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, Mr. Justice Samuel Freedman, Chancellor of the U. of M. and William Nicks, President of the Bank of Nova Scotia are only a few of the outstanding men who have graduated from St. John's. It is our duty to our school and to ourselves to maintain the fine traditions set by our predecessors.

And at this time, when we are thinking of past laurels, we would like to thank those who have made them possible, our parents, our teachers, and our friends. We thank our parents for the patience, guidance, and love which they have given so freely. We can never fully repay them for all they have done. The best we can do is strive to fulfill the hopes and expectations they hold for us. The staff of St. John's has always had a keen interest in school activities and in our education. Today, as a graduating class, we wish to express our deep appreciation for all their efforts on our behalf.

Our thoughts are also of the future. We have been taught to be honorable, honest, courageous, courteous, charitable, and to believe in God's goodness and infinite wisdom. But unfortunately, we have also acquired prejudices, jealousies, and unfounded fears. Our task is to overcome these undesirable traits, for we see the tragic results of such fears, prejudices and jealousies in our present day world. Today, because of the lust for power, the struggle for world domination, and even the battle for human minds, millions of people are still suffering, sixteen years after the war, to end all wars, has ended. Such is the irony of human accomplishments.

Therefore, we must choose to possess "beauty without vanity, strength without insolence, courage without ferocity, and all the virtues becoming to man without acquiring his vices." We must go forth to meet the shadowy future, fearlessly. But although we make the choice bravely, and without hesitation, we stand crammed full of academic knowledge, and no experience, as the young sailor stands at the helm, feeling for the first time the furor of the storm. We, the generation of today, have a much more difficult task before us than any previous generation has had. We face, not only the challenge of a turbulent world, but also, in this perilous Atomic Age, the problem of bare physical, spiritual and emotional survival. Perhaps to us, will be given the honor of forming a world Utopia of universal brotherhood.

So the thoughts of youth continue. They are both happy and sad thoughts. We think of our protected childhood and adolescence and of this time in our lives, when we must cross a threshold, into an adult world bent on self-destruction. We think happy thoughts of our alma mater, and of the torch she has placed in our hands to hold high. And we think of her motto—Usque ad astra—right to the stars. St. John's motto has become a reality. Man has conquered outer space. But to us, the graduating class of 1961, the poetic dream of reaching the stars has yet to be attained. By remembering the knowledge and understanding which we have been accorded, and by using them, we too, like former graduates of St. John's will be able to produce tangible evidence that this school has made great contributions in the many phases of scholarship, citizenship, and sportsmanship, in Canada and the world. It is up to us then, to uphold the high traditions of our forefathers—"to strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield."
























PETER KAMINSKY — Peter is one of our scholars. He believes that too much school is not good for one's health, so he takes a few days off now and then.







The Glee Club






Canada - A Democracy

Canada is a great nation: great not only as a nation among other nations, but also in its immense size. Canada is a known power, perhaps not as powerful as Russia, but a nation which holds its own in world affairs. Canada is also known for its democratic way of life. It is at this point that a question arises. Exactly what is a democracy? Does Canada meet or better the conditions upon which a country can be called democratic? What part does the government play? These and other questions are among those which I will try to answer.

Democracy is government by the people, with the people possessing entire control and equal rights in all that concerns or belongs to the state. It is government with the consent of the governed, limited only by the fact that the laws and circumstances of the governed must accord with the wishes of the majority as expressed through the vote. It originated in small Grecian states where the right to vote was limited to certain classes. The democratic ideal, however, has persisted through the centuries, at times suppressed and dormant, a half-forgotten and somewhat scorned tradition, only to burst forth again whenever conditions imposed by other forms of rule became intolerable.

Today, in countries such as Canada, which seek to be truly democratic, the individual's liberties and rights are respected. No greater difference can be found between dictatorships, whatever their form, and democracies. Democracies find that it is not always easy to live up to their highest ideals of free government—for democracy is not merely majority rule, or indeed at its best a set of rules at all. It is a way of government and life based on a sense of fair play, tolerance, justice, and co-operation.

These rights and liberties are in Canada chiefly as an inheritance from Britain where they were won slowly, and rather painfully, through many centuries of struggle. Among these rights and liberties are freedom of assembly, the right of petition, freedom of worship, equality before the law, the right and the freedom to vote, and the right of free association.

The right of free association is the right of peo-

ple to form all kinds of voluntary organizations for purposes in which they are interested, without government interference. Many of these associations do work of the greatest importance in education, recreation, religion, the organization of public opinion, the relief of distress, and so forth. In dictatorships such widespread use of voluntary associations is unknown, and would be regarded as being highly dangerous. In democratic countries such as Canada, however, unless such voluntary organizations are formed with the idea of breaking or defying the law, it is the government's duty to interfere with them as little as possible, and in many cases to protect and work with them.

Democracy and freedom depend not on a few leaders, but on the rank and file of all citizens, young and old alike; and the greatest danger which faces democracy in our modern world is that the peoples of democratic nations themselves may not understand or believe in their own institutions enough to want to preserve them and to make them work.

Today, governments provide services that were unthinkable a century ago-not only education for all, but protection for health, and many other aids such as children's allowances, old age pensions, and so forth. However, in spite of the fact that government can do only what the people themselves pay for, there is the temptation to think that the more governments do, the more people should get, and that the citizen himself has little or no responsibility However, one of the wisest things ever said about the democratic citizen and his government is often forgotten: "Those who have responsibilities without rights are slaves; those who have rights without responsibilities are parasites." Democracies require from their people not merely obedience, but judgment, restraint, self-discipline, and a spirit of co-operation.

Today, moreover, Canada's influence goes far beyond the bounds of Canada itself, for we are citizens not only of a country, but of a world, which everywhere needs the spirit of democracy at its best if it is to solve its problems of world government.

Climbing Mount North



THE CURLING CLUB




THE CHEERLEADERS
