



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The Spirit of St. John's

Principal's Message...

ONCE AGAIN THE time of year has come when the editor of your Torch has requested a foreword for the new edition. As I sit at my desk at home pondering what to write, I hear the scream of a jet plane passing overhead from north horizon to south horizon in a matter of seconds. Last evening my neighbor in his home received a phone call at 6:45 telling him that a cancellation made it possible for him to catch the next T.C.A. flight for Toronto. At 11:45 his wife received a long distance call from him in his hotel room in Toronto—a quiet, uneventful trip! And as I thought of these events and recalled that 1957-58 will probably be written down in history as the years of "Sputnik" and I.C.B.M.'s. I was overwhelmed by the speed of change and its impact on your world.

Have you ever tried to compare your world with that of the years when St. John's first enrolled its students? In 1910 there were very few telephones, no radio nor T.V.; very few automobiles—no planes, nor jets, and dreams of trips to the moon were not even imaginative. And today you so take these methods of communication for granted that a student in one of Mr. Dack's classes interpreted the sentence from his history text "Lord Durham made a flying visit to upper Canada in 1844" to mean that "Lord Durham in 1844 went to Upper Canada by airplane"! You live in an everchanging situation and the speed of change has been so increased in this past half century that one cannot attempt to forecast the future advances in physical sciences, nor what you may encounter as you leave school to make your living in a disturbed and uneasy world.

We can, however, give thanks that all is not changing, that certain fundamental truths remain, that there is safe anchorage in the realm of the spirit. Honor, honesty, courage, courtesy, charity, faith in the goodness of God—these still remain unchanged and unchanging. And it is our wish and hope that your years in this school have helped you to develop those qualities and attitudes which will enable you best to meet the challenge of your changing world.


ROUGH SEASON FOR TIGERS





Having reached the finals Tech fell short to Sisler in two games. Both games were well contested but the powerful Spartan team could not be denied.




Bowlers Capture Championship






Council Upholds Traditions





as it was this year.




The Dance Group


